# VOTE 2025

**LOCAL ELECTIONS** 

The next local government elections are on Saturday 11 October 2025. Anyone who is currently enrolled can vote in local elections where they live and have a say on the people who will make decisions on what happens in your region over the next three years.

In New Zealand, all local body elections are held by postal vote. That means you need to fill in your voting form and post it back before midday on 11 October 2025.

# **Enrol to vote**

If you are registered to vote in Parliamentary elections (a Parliamentary elector), you are automatically enrolled as a residential elector to vote in local authority elections. The address where you are registered as a Parliamentary elector will be in the council district for the local authority elections. You will receive a voting document in the mail so that you can vote by post.

### Not on the roll?

Enrol by 1 August so you can vote. If you enrol after 1 August, you will need to cast a 'special vote'.

# How to enrol for the first time

An application for registration as a parliamentary elector can be made online by clicking the link above. The identity verification needed is a New Zealand driver licence, New Zealand passport or RealMe verified identity.

If you are not able to enrol online, you can enrol or update your details in other ways, more information can be found on the Electoral Commission website **vote.nz** or you can call 0800 36 76 56 to arrange for forms to be sent to you directly.

# General roll or Māori roll?

If you're of Māori descent and enrolling for the first time, you can decide which electoral roll you want to be on; the general roll or the Māori Roll. If you're on the Māori Roll and your local authority has a Māori ward or constituency, you'll vote for a candidate in the Māori ward.

# District Licensing Committee positions

Are you community-minded and looking for a new challenge?

Buller District Council is calling for expressions of interest to fill two positions on its District Licensing Committee.

The District Licencing Committee (DLC) is responsible for determining all new alcohol licences and managers' certificates plus renewal applications throughout the Buller District.

The role of the licensing committee members is to provide a quality service to the council and its customers and exercise the DLC's powers and functions under the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012.

Committee members serve a term of five years from their appointment date in a paid, part-time capacity.

You cannot apply if you are involved with the alcohol industry or are a constable, Medical Officer of Health, licensing inspector or an employee of the territorial authority.

Expressions of Interest close at 4:30 pm on Thursday 1 May 2025. Further information and application forms are available online on Council's website: bullerdc.govt.nz/licences-and-permits/alcohol-licensing/district-licencing-committee/or in hard copy from Council's offices in Westport and Reefton.

# Wherever you pay rates you can vote

Do you live in one area and pay rates on a property in another area? Did you know you may qualify to vote in both areas at the local authority elections in October 2025?

Voting is a way to have your say on what happens in your local community. If you'd like to vote in this election, read on to find out if you're eligible, and how to enrol.

Electors fall into two categories:

Residential electors – If you are registered to vote on the electoral roll, you are automatically enrolled to vote in local authority elections.

You will receive a voting document so that you can vote by post.

Ratepayer electors – You may also be eligible to enrol as a non-resident ratepayer elector in a council district if both of the following apply:

- You are on the district valuation roll and pay rates in the council district
- The address where you are registered as a parliamentary

elector is outside that council district.

Your eligibility to enrol or be nominated as a ratepayer elector may also depend on your individual circumstances as determined by criteria in the Local Electoral Act 2001 and its regulations.

The Ratepayer Electoral Roll closes on 1 August 2025, so enrol now at www.ratepayer.co.nz






