# Weeds to watch out for this summer



Wild cherry (Prunus avium) has become a significant problem in the Buller region, with several areas experiencing serious infestations. Many will notice how widespread it has become each spring when its flowers appear, particularly where it has spread from gardens into natural ecosystems.

When wild cherry thickets take over wetland or estuarine areas like those in the Orowaiti, native biodiversity declines dramatically. This impacts whitebait breeding habitats and disrupts the natural hydrology and drainage of these systems. Additionally, as wild cherry spreads through regenerating native bush it slows and alters the process of natural regeneration, creating conditions that allow other exotic weeds to thrive.

The West Coast Regional Council, Department of Conservation, and Buller District Council are committed to protecting our natural environment and are actively working to control the spread of wilding cherry trees, particularly in sensitive areas like estuaries.

While we've made progress, cherry trees remain widespread throughout



the Buller District, and we need your help to prevent them from spreading further.

Wild cherries reproduce prolifically, with their seeds often dispersed by birds and river systems. To prevent these invasive trees from overtaking native ecosystems, we're encouraging all Buller landowners to remove wild cherries from their properties. Consider repurposing the wood by using it for firewood, furniture or woodchips, and replanting the cleared areas with native species like kōwhai.

For landowners removing wild cherries, the West Coast Regional Council can provide a stump gel to ensure that cut trees do not resprout.

# **NZ Creative Communities Scheme Funding round dates 2025**



### **Funding from the Creative Communities Scheme is** available for communitybased arts activities in the **Buller District.**

The Scheme aims to increase participation in the arts at a local level and increase the range and diversity of arts available to communities.

The Scheme is a partnership between Creative New Zealand and local authorities. Each local authority is responsible for delivering the Scheme in its area.

Local decision-making is the key to the Scheme, and applications are considered by a subcommittee, which consists of two Councillors, one representative from the local lwi, one representative from each of the three Community Arts Councils (Karamea, Buller, and Inangahua), and two community members.

There are three funding rounds for each financial year (1 July-30 June), and \$19,000 is available.

Please note that groups or organisations must provide a copy of their latest financial statement.
